

Celebrating 25 Years of Service in World Missions 1989–2014

If someone a sked me 25 years ago where I would be living and what I would be doing in 2014, I don't know what I would have said. Even just ten years ago, I didn't picture myself here on the continent of Africa. Though as I think about it, I would never want to miss this season in

my life. Some thoughts in particular on the last seven years in ten nations here in Africa:

- Love God and Love and Serve Others: through fulfilling times with our patients and their caregivers in the wards, HOPE Center, Deck 7 and even in some of their homes. Seeing transformation taking place. Many of these relationships started at the various surgical screenings. When I think about a particular country, it is the people of that nation that I remember in my heart and mind.
- Being on field service for ten months allows for deeper relationships with our local workers and partners—sharing life and experiences with them learning from each other and praying for each other.
- Love Others: by spending quality and quantity of time at various orphanages loving on children, some who are now teenagers and others are adults. Being 'Uncle' to many.
- Be People of Integrity and Excellence: by using my giftings in administration in my service to the Lord.

3 Roles in 25 years

Even though people change jobs often and that occurs here with Mercy Ships also, I have basically had just three roles over these 25



years. Starting at the US Office in 1989 till 1994 as the accountant. I transitioned from the US to the *Caribbean Mercy* when offered the role of Financial Officer and as part of the Senior Management Team from 1994—2005. In 2005, there were some months of not knowing where God was leading, but continuing to pray and to seek His plan and direction for my life. I was so excited when accepted to be the Programs Administrator on board the *Africa Mercy*. The ship was delayed with final renovations in England but after four months there, I flew to the *Anastasis* in

Ghana in West Africa in June 2006 . This began a new season in my life. Some of my responsibilities as Programs Adminis-



trator include: working on our project plans, budgets, reports, expenses, statistics and metrics, travel, advance team liaison and serving on assessment, evaluation and advance teams. "You will never be completely at home again, because part of your heart always will be elsewhere. That is the price you pay for the richness of loving and knowing people in more than one place." I read this quote and it is so true. Even though I have transitioned to serve here in Africa, part of my heart remains in Central America and in the Dominican Republic.

Through the internet, I stay in touch with some of my dear amigos, but it is not the



same as being there face-to-face. I felt from God that even though I may not return to those places on a Mercy Ship, it doesn't mean I will never travel there as time and finances are available.

These 25 years of service would not been possible without the support of many. I think of those who responded back in 1989 with a commitment to pray for me regularly and as the Lord brought me to their minds and hearts. A huge thank you to all those who have provided and continue to provide financial support monthly for years and a few for the entire 25 years.
